

Among the more important objects forming part of a collection of Burmese, Indian, and Japanese curios, advertised for sale by auction by Messrs. Phillips, Son, and Neale, of New Bond-street, on Wednesday, is an Indian idol of some value and celebrity. It is the representative of a deity to whom Hindoo women pay peculiar worship and is known as the original "Lingam God," to whose shrine at Delhi thousands of Hindoos of every rank journeyed yearly from all parts of India to pay their devotions for a period covering about 1,000 years until about the year 1193, when the Mahomedan conqueror, Kutb-ud-din, having wrested Delhi from the Hindoo Kings, destroyed the twenty-seven Hindoo temples. The "Lingam God" consists of an extraordinary chrysoberyl cat's-eye, of great size and brilliancy, set in a large yellow topaz, the whole supported on a native Indian gold base, incrusted with diamonds, and set round with nine gems, called the nine charms—namely, diamond, ruby, sapphire, chrysoberyl cat's-eye, coral, pearl, hyacinthine garnet, yellow sapphire and emerald.

It is questionable, the *Standard* thinks, whether a London auctioneer ever had the opportunity of offering for sale a more remarkable relic than the "Lingam god," which was yesterday disposed of by Messrs. Phillips and Son to the highest bidder. With all its merits—tangible and legendary—all that a discerning public bid for the "Lingam god" was £2450, and at this figure it was duly disposed of to a Bond-street dealer, little better than given away.







The Mooltan Fireplace was designed  
about 1891 or 92 for the Fine Art Museum  
Procter & Co at Lahore. In 1894 it was used to

decorate the Viceroy's large Reception Hall on  
the occasion of the Durbar held at Lahore in that year.

It is believed to be the only one of its kind  
existing.

The Persian characters are (freely translated)  
as follows:

"Oh. Sahib may thy threshold  
Like the Stars be full of light  
The Scales of Justice in thy hand  
For ever balanced be."

The Fire place is considered to be one of the best  
Specimens of Mooltan Tile Work, both as regards  
the purity of colors and completeness of the design.
